It may sound strange to be thankful for the things that cause us pain, but often those situations bring lasting strength and increased confidence in our Lord's ability to bring good. Adversity often helps us realize the magnitude of our blessings. Pain can point us to our loving God.

Those who trust in the Lord Jesus Christ know that He understands our challenges and our heartaches. We understand that unexpected blessings

can come as a result. We know that the greatest of all blessings is yet to come - an eternity of things for which to be thankful in heaven.

Call Committee Update

Pastor Wessel, Circuit Pastor, presented the call list to the committee on Sunday, October 6th. His instructions were: *1. Publish the list of candidates within 14 days*

2. Assemble the Call Documents to include salary and benefits.

3. Contact all pastors on the call list to find out if they are interested in being on the list.

The call list was published in the October 9th and 13th bulletin. The congregation nominated eight of the fourteen candidates.

Pastor Wessel stressed that the benefits package will be an important factor in a Pastor's decision to accept or turn down a call. The Elders are putting the proper documents together.

Dan Heike volunteered to contact the candidates; a task that was more difficult than expected. It took several calls, texts, or emails before Dan received an answer from several candidates. Over half declined to be on the list.

The Call List was received sooner than anticipated and the Committee has taken advantage of that. The goal is to move the process along quickly while making the best decisions for Zion. The Call Committee is meeting as often as possible based on the member's schedules. Advent and Lent are not appropriate times to make a Call. Congregations expect to celebrate those seasons with their Pastor. The Committee members are pushing themselves to gather all necessary data as fast as they can anticipating a Congregational Call Meeting before Christmas.

Additional information on the candidates and the Congregational Call Meeting (when voting happens) will be published in the bulletin as soon as available. Continue to ask the Committee members questions and keep the call process in your prayers. The Call Committee

Fall Sunday Education Hour

Council Minutes October 10, 2024

The Thursday, October 10, 2024 Zion Lutheran Church council meeting was called to order by Andy Heike, Vice President in the fellowship hall at 7:00 p.m. Pastor Mark Benning opened with Psalm 46 (which Martin Luther based his hymn "A Mighty Fortress is Our God") and prayer.

Recording Secretary's Report- The minutes from the September 12 meeting were presented. Galen Aase made a motion to approve the minutes with the following amendments- church signs for the entrances to Mondovi along the highways are being considered, nominations for officers need to be done for the October 23/27, Oct. 30/Nov. 3 bulletins and for the November newsletter, plans for the 75th Anniversary were tabled, seconded by Deborah Deutscher. Motion carried.

Financial Secretary's/Treasurer's Report- Deborah Deutscher reported on the church finances. The TIM quarterly pledge was short. Joe Osenga made a motion to accept that Deborah covered the quarterly payment from the general account, seconded by Oscar Howell. Motion carried.

Pastor's Report- Vacancy Pastor Mark Benning reported that as the Thursday morning Bible study will soon be done with their present study they will next meet again in January 2025 and are invited to attend the Sunday morning Bible study. There are 20 confirmation students (they are scheduled to acolyte) and the altar guild was informed of a need to be sure to have oil in the candle lighter/snuffers. Joe Osenga made a motion to have Thanksgiving worship service on Wednesday, November 27 at 7:00 p.m., seconded by Gene Schultz. Motion carried.

Elder's Report- Joe Osenga reported that the elders discussed the budget, the youth possibly helping with some work needed at the German Valley Cemetery, set the elder serving schedule, and discussed filling an elder position. Joe Osenga made a motion to appoint David Reineke to the elder position, seconded by Galen Aase. Motion carried. The elders will at their meeting discuss whether or not to continue the first Sunday of the month loose change offering.

Board of Trustees Report- Oscar Howell reported on the carpeting of the steps at the front entrance to the church and that the fence along the creek is finished- thank you trustees and volunteers.

Youth Committee- Joe Osenga reported on the youths plans to have a pumpkin fest October 13 and the youth plan to help with serving the German dinner October 20.

Evangelism Committee- The Evangelism Committee plans to meet a week later than planned. They do plan to donate kits of toiletries to the Luke 3:11.

Old Business- Deborah Deutscher reported on a donation of \$500.00 from Scheels that she put towards Youth Events Fund. There will be five members attending the Adult Gathering in Wausau October 15. Nominations for officers were discussed. The following will run again for their present office: Andy Heike, Deborah Deutscher, Joe Osenga, Matt Mohn (will be asked at the elder's meeting), Galen Aase, Oscar Howell. Mike Ashwell will also run for a trustee position. There is a need for a nominee for Recording Secretary.

New Business- Deborah Deutscher made a motion to put the Orphan Grain Train information on Zion's webpage, seconded by Joe Osenga. Motion carried. Pastor Mark Benning reported that the quilters donated \$2,575 and 32 guilts to the Orphan Grain Train disaster relief. With the 2025 District Convention in June to be held at Rothschild there is a need for the information to be filled out for one Pastor and one lay delegate. It was suggested with technology concerns that a committee be formed to handle any long range plans that need to be considered. The elders will discuss this at their meeting. The council then looked at the proposed budgets, made some changes and considered the Christian Service Committee be called Christian Care Committee (the committee will continue being called Christian Service Committee). Galen Aase made a motion to approve the proposed budget for 2025 to be presented at the Voter's Assembly for approval, seconded by Joe Osenga. Deborah Deutscher reported that the proposed budget for 2025 will need to include \$3000.00 to \$4000.00 for Zion's 75th Anniversary. Motion carried. Galen Aase added that the Wall of Honor is again being planned. The next Quarterly Voter's meeting will be Sunday, November 3 at 10:30 a.m. The next council meeting will be November 14.

VICE PRESIDENT - Perform President duties in his absence, Assist President in his duties as assigned.

RECORDING SECRETARY - Keep accurate minutes of Voter's Assembly and Council. File, signed by President, copies in permanent records. Maintain an accurate list of voting members and all officers, boards and committees.

TREASURER - Promptly pay all bills and salaries authorized by Voter's Assembly, boards or the President. Keep accurate records in books (computer programs) and submit for audit. Submit a report at each Council, Voter's Assembly.

BOARD OF ELDERS - Be an example of Christian living. Assist the Pastor in all matters pertaining to spiritual welfare of the congregation, doctrinal matters and matters pertaining to the godly walk of life for Pastor, officers, and members of the congregation, observing the Lord's

instructions in Matthew 18: 15-18. Help the Pastor arrange pulpit supplies, special services, and guest speakers. Ensure worship services are conducted orderly and decently. Each Elder is assigned to serve on a committee and report to the Elders and Council of those committee's activities.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES - Keep record of all meetings and decisions made by them at said meetings. Be legal representatives of the congregation. Be custodians of the congregational properties including all valuable papers such as deeds, documents, insurance policies, certificates of incorporation, etc. In an emergency, perform all acts necessary for the protection of congregational property. Have authority to propose projects and submit to voters. Supervise hired and volunteer workers involved in maintenance and operations of the church property and submit reviews of performance and salaries recommendations for the budget.

All officers are members of the Church Council. It is the duty of the church council members to meet regularly, to consider and discuss all matters pertaining to the spiritual and material welfare of the congregation.


